- F. **PUBLIC HEARING(s), SPECIAL PRESENTATION(s), & PROCLAMATION(s).**
  - 1. Mayor Williams presented the 2015 employee service awards.

**G. COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC**

- Jim Falkner, 1014 W. 3<sup>rd</sup>, asked about the progress on codification and expressed concern over a stray animal he took to the animal shelter which was not required to be tagged when it was picked up by the owner.
- Pastor Mark Wilson invited everyone to the Coffeyville Thanksgiving service on Sunday, November 22, 6 p.m., at the First United Methodist Church.
- Richard Pugh, 905 Eldridge Street, stated the City is the biggest violator of the weed ordinance.
- Margaret Lindell, 4<sup>th</sup> Street, expressed concern over the timing of the street lights in the downtown.
- Tosha Williams, 2203 W 2<sup>nd</sup>, thanked the City for applying for the safe routes to school grant.
- Katie Lawrence, 612 W 1<sup>st</sup>, stated the property behind her house is full of trash and timber and expressed concern over the code enforcement officer contacting her about the condition of her property as she is recycling.

**I. NEW BUSINESS**

1. Resolution No. R-15-138 – A Resolution to execute an agreement with KC Utility Packaging for substation equipment for the electric utility.
  - Electric Utility Deputy Director Mike Shook stated four proposals were received for the substation steel for the New Generation Power Plant with KC Utility Packaging being the low bidder at \$54,593.46.

2. Resolution No. R-15-139 – A Resolution to execute an agreement with CCC Group for electrical installation services for the electric utility.
  - Electric Utility Deputy Director Mike Shook stated four proposals were received for the electrical installation services for the New Generation Power Plant with CCC Group being the low bidder at \$2,756,842.

3. Resolution No. R-15-140 – A Resolution to execute Task Authorization #6 with Burns & McDonnell for environmental specialist and field testing support for the electric utility.
  - Electric Utility Deputy Director Mike Shook stated Phase I and Phase II environmental assessments were completed for the New Generation Power Plant by the Kansas Department of Health & Environment. No soil contamination was found on site, however, KDHE has recommended during the drill pier phase and underground duct bank installation phase, any groundwater encountered be analyzed for contamination.

Burns & McDonnell will provide this service under task authorization #6 at a cost not to exceed \$101,150.

4. Resolution No. R-15-141 – A Resolution to execute a change order with Wartsila to supply remote system control access for the electric utility.

- Electric Utility Deputy Director Mike Shook stated this change order is to provide secure remote access of the Wartsila control systems; this item was inadvertently left out of the original Wartsila scope. The cost of the change order is \$26,912.

5. Resolution No. R-15-142 – A Resolution to execute an engagement letter with Allen, Gibbs & Houlik for sales and use tax consulting services.

- Finance Director Stephanie Richardson stated staff consulted with the Kansas Department of Revenue for assistance in determining the sales and use tax application for purchases related to the New Generation Power Plant. Following the discussion, there are still questions pertaining to the taxability of certain services and materials. Burns & McDonnell recommended a tax attorney or CPA assist the city. Larry Arnold with Allen, Gibbs & Houlik has provided these services for other clients in the power generation industry and will provide the services for Coffeyville at a not to exceed fee of \$15,000.

6. Ordinance No. G-15-06 – First Reading of an Ordinance to amend the weed ordinance.

- City Attorney Paul Kritz stated the current weed ordinance as written is inconsistency and leads to confusion in enforcement. Staff compared ordinances from several cities and incorporated the best practices into a common sense approach to dealing with high grass and weeds. Commissioner Martin wanted clarification on how abandoned rail spurs would be handled; Taylor expressed concern about industrial properties and suggested there needed to be exceptions as people are poor.
